New President Appointed for AL al-Bayt University

A Royal Decree was issued on June 27, 2005 appointing Dr. Adel Tweissi President of AL al-Bayt University.

Dr. Tweissi obtained the Bachelor's degree in English Language and Literature from the University of Jordan in 1978, the Master's Degree in Linguistics from Michigan State University/USA, in 1984, and the Doctoral degree in Linguistics from the University of Michigan, USA, in 1987.

Before joining AL Al-Bayt University, Dr. Tweissi served as Secretary General of the Ministry of Higher Education (Dec. 2004- June 2005); before that he served as President of Al-Hussein Bin Talal University (1999-2004).

From 1997-1999, Dr. Tweissi was Dean of Student Affairs at Mu'tah University; Dean of its Faculty of Sciences and Arts, from 1996-1997; Dean of its Faculty of Arts, from 1992-1994; and Assistant to the President for Development Affairs from 1995-1996.

Other posts at Mu'tah University included Vice Dean of Student Affairs, in 1991; Assistant Dean of Student Affairs, in 1990; and Coordinator of the English Section: Department of Humanities, from 1987-1989.

During the academic year 1994/1995, Dr. Tweissi went to Oman where he served as Dean of the Technical Industrial College of Nizwa.

While pursuing graduate studies in the USA, Dr. Tweissi worked at the University of Michigan (USA) from 1984-1987 as Teaching Assistant of introductory courses in Linguistics, and as Teaching Assistant of Arabic for speakers of other languages at the same University from 1982-1984.

Dr. Tweissi is member on several committees and his academic research has been published in refereed journals worldwide.

University Celebrates the Graduation of its Seventh Batch of 3457 Students

Under the patronage of its newly-appointed President Dr. Adel Tweissi, AL al-Bayt University celebrated the graduation of its seventh batch of students during the period July 7-9,2005 for approximately 3457 graduates (3223 graduates at the Bachelor's level, 161 at the Master's level, and 73 at the Higher Diploma level).

On the first day of exercises, (287) students from the Faculty of Islamic risprudence and Law, (553) students from the Faculty of Economics and Administrative Sciences, and (202) students from Prince Al-Hussein Bin Abdullah Faculty Information Technology received their certificates.

On the second day, certificates were presented to (1083) graduates from the Faculty of Arts and Sciences, (48) graduates from the Higher Institute of the Earth and Environmental Sciences, and (28) graduates from Bayt Al-Hikmah (House of Wisdom) Higher Institute.

The third and final day was devoted for (969) students from the Faculty of Educational Sciences, (53) students from Princess Salma Bint Abdullah Faculty of Nursing, (161) Master's students and (73) Higher Diploma students.

In his address on the occasion, Dean of Student Affairs Khalil Hajjaj gave an address in which he congratulated graduates on their achievements, and thanked faculty members for the efforts they have exerted over the past years. He also acknowledged the financial and moral support provided by parents.

Dean Hajjaj called on graduates to commit themselves to a process of lifelong learning as this new age of possibilities entails very serious challenges. "You must continue to build upon the level of education you have gained at the University. During the period you have spent at the University, you have acquired the core knowledge and developed the skills and work ethics needed to compete in this new age. But you must make optimal use of what you have acquired. Standing still in a flat world is analogous to losing ground," he said.

Dr. Hajjaj voiced hope that graduates would remain faithful and committed to their Alma Mater in the future, and would serve their community to the best of their abilities.

This year's celebration marked the graduation of the first ever batch of students from the University's Princess Salma Bint Abdullah Faculty of Nursing.

For the Record

Some 575 students (304 at the Bachelor's level and 271 at

the Master's level) graduated during the first ever Graduation Ceremony - Al-Hussein Bin Talal Batch, in the academic year 1998/1999.

The second batch of graduates - Imam Hanifa Bin Nu'man Batch - of the academic year 1999/2000, comprised 985 students (759 at the Bachelor's level, 204 at the Master's level, and 22 at the Higher Diploma level).

The third batch of graduates - Imam Malik Bin Anas Batch - of the academic year 2000/2001 reached 947 students (807 students at the Bachelor's level, 109 at the Master's level, and 31 at the Higher Diploma level).

The fourth batch of graduates of the academic year 2001/2002 reached 1325 students (1144 students at the Bachelor's level, 133 at the Master's level, and 48 at the Higher Diploma level).

The fifth batch of graduates of the academic year 2002/2003 reached 1454 students (1261 students at the Bachelor's level, 141 at the Master's level, and 52 at the Higher Diploma level).

The sixth batch of graduates of the academic year 2003/2004 reached 2400 students (2174 students at the Bachelor's level, 62 at the Master's level, and 164 at the Higher Diploma level).



Faculty of Educational Sciences

Faculty of Educational Sciences Organises Scientific Day

"One basic mission of the University is to provide adequate training for cadres in the various fields and domains with the objective of turning to the market professional skills and leaders in keeping with the country's need", Acting President Ahmad Alawneh said on June 7, 2005.



In the presence of Acting President Ahmad Alawneh, Director of the Department of Arab and Middle Eastern Affairs at the Jordanian Ministry of Foreign Affairs Saleh Jawazneh inaugurated at AL al-Bayt University on May 22, 2005, activities of the conference on: "Oman's Foreign Relations and Policy."

In his address on the two-day forum, Mr. Jawazneh noted that Jordan was one of the first countries to support the Sulatnate of Oman and to maintain, ever since, good working and friendly relations with this country.

At the closing session, panelists called for an effective mobilization of contemporary media to convey to the public the true essence of the Omani experience which holds tight to its long-standing Arab and Muslim tradition and civilization, while keeping track of prevalent worldwide developments, trends and innovations.

Also, panelists approved the publication of the proceedings of this conference for the benefit of faculty, students, and researchers who are interested in documenting the various historical, cultural and social aspects of Oman.

Other recommendations suggested during this session was the possibility of holding the coming conference in Oman under the title: "Modern Development in Oman: Reality and Aspirations." Henceforth, this annual event is to be held in Jordan and Oman alternately.

During HIIAA Open Day Alawneh Inspects Graduation Projects of Students of Architecture

Jordan's Foreign Policy

In cooperation between Bayt AL-Hikmah (House of Wisdom) Higher Institute and Al-Hussein Cultural Centre, a symposium was held on May 10, 2005, on: "Jordan's Foreign Policy."

Speaking at the symposium, Senator Nayef Al-Qadi noted that as a small state with limited resources, the primary concern of Jordan, throughout history, was to safeguard the country's immediate national interests. However, the Hashemite leadership has concurrently pursued a number of grand strategic objectives designed to revitalize and reshape the Arab world and the Middle East. Jordan's geostrategic outlook can therefore best be described as operating on two distinct, yet, sometimes, interacting levels. The first involves activities, behavior and decisions that are related to the immediate welfare and survival of the country. The second track is a long-term activist orientation designed to spur a renewal of Arab energies and promote the overall well-being of the Middle East.

Also addressing the symposium was Senator Klibb Al-Fawwaz who said that Jordan's foreign policy is based on the principle of respect for international legitimacy, the UN Charter and resolutions as well as the sovereignty and territorial integrity of other states.

Jordan and its people are an integral part of the Arab nation and its foreign policy has always asserted and encouraged maintaining brotherly relations with all Arab countries with a view to strengthening pan-

Arab solidarity by strengthening the community of interests towards achieving economic prosperity and security.

Architect Addresses Management of Architectural Sites

Dean of Prince Hussein Bin Abdullah Faculty for Information Technology Isma'il Ababneh presented students with samples of exam questions and informed students about the mechanism of answering them in accordance with the instructions laid down by ETS.

Keeping health in mind: 10 steps to keep your memory sharp. After 20 minutes of searching, you finally find your glasses resting on your forehead. You've gone to the basement three times in hopes of remembering why you went there the first time. You just poured orange juice into your cereal. Are you losing your mind? Probably not.

Memory loss is a common complaint, and it's typically blamed on aging. People fear that memory lapses are signs of what's in store.

But take note: Dementia a mental decline advanced enough to affect daily activities, the most common form of which is Alzheimer's disease is more than forgetfulness. Only about 10 percent to 20 percent of people older than 65 get dementia, so most people who occasionally forget things simply have too much on their mind.

Though it's impossible to predict memory loss, you can do your best to prevent it. Follow these 10 steps suggested by Paul Takahashi, M.D., a specialist in geriatrics at Mayo Clinic, Rochester, Minn., and an expert on cognitive decline.

Step 1: Exercise your mind

Just as physical activity keeps your body strong, mental activity keeps your mind sharp and agile.

If you continue to learn and challenge yourself, your brain continues to grow, literally. Regardless of age, an active brain produces new dendrites connections between nerve cells that allow cells to communicate with one another. This helps the brain store and retrieve information more easily, no matter what your age.

How can you challenge yourself? Try:

Learning to play a musical instrument

Playing Scrabble or doing crossword puzzles Interacting with people

Switching careers or starting a new one

Starting a new hobby, such as crafts, painting, biking or bird-watching Learning a foreign language Volunteering

Staying informed about what's going on in the world Reading

Step 2: Stay physically active

Daily physical activity can help improve blood flow. Some people find it's easier to get motivated when they exercise with a friend. Some choose a favorite pet to accompany them on walks. However you choose to get moving, include these three activities as important fitness components in your routine:

Aerobic activity. Activities such as brisk walking, bicycling or swimming slow the age-related loss of aerobic capacity the ability of your heart, lungs and blood vessels to deliver adequate oxygen to your muscles during physical activity. The net result of aerobic activity is increased stamina and endurance. It also can decrease high blood pressure, which may reduce your risk of stroke, heart disease, kidney disease and other related conditions.

Strength training. Increasing your strength by using weights or elastic resistance bands can slow or even reverse the loss of

muscle mass associated with aging. Strength training also can slow bone loss, cut your risk of injury and make you feel more energetic.

Stretching. Stretching increases the range in which you can bend and stretch joints, muscles and ligaments, helping to decrease stiffness and prevent injury.

"Exercising also helps your mood," says Dr. Takahashi. "People who exercise briefly each day maybe get some sunlight certainly have better moods." During the day, you'll be more awake, more alert and quicker on the mental draw. And chances are if you're exercising regularly, you'll sleep better, too.

Step 3: Eat, drink and be healthy

Eat a diet rich in fruits and vegetables. These contain antioxidants substances that protect and nourish brain cells. As an added bonus, these foods may reduce your risk of cancer, high blood pressure, coronary artery disease, diabetes and osteoporosis.

And you've heard it before drink water. Water is essential to the human body. Water practically is the human body making up about 70 percent of your body weight. Lack of water leads to dehydration, which can leave you feeling tired, making it hard to concentrate. So drink up. Here are some tips:

Fill up a water bottle and keep it close at hand.

Have a glass of water at lunch instead of soft drinks, coffee or other beverages that may dehydrate you. It's cheaper on the pocketbook and better for your body.

Step 4: Develop a system of reminders and cues

Information comes at you from all directions all the time. Sometimes it's necessary to take extra steps to remind yourself of what's important. Work through the information overload with these memory triggers:

Write it down. Keep a diary, use calendars and make lists.

Establish a routine. Store easy-to-lose items in the same place. Complete tasks in the same order. Change is difficult and takes extra effort.

Set up cues. For instance, put your keys on the ironing board. That way you're more likely to remember to turn off the iron before walking out the door.

Practice repetition. "To help remember a person's name, I'll work it into the conversation several times after being introduced," says Dr. Takahashi. "Repetition ingrains the information in your mind. It's a great habit to get into because it works."

Step 5: Take time to remember things

Normal aging changes the brain, which makes your mind slightly less efficient in processing new information.

But Dr. Takahashi emphasizes that wisdom can compensate for physical changes. "It's true that we lose some capacity for new memory," says Dr. Takahashi. However, experience compensates for this loss. "Older adults can still operate at an extremely high functional level despite physiologic changes."

Forgetfulness may indicate nothing more than having too much on your mind. Slow down and pay full attention to the task at hand, whatever it may be.

Step 6: Learn relaxation techniques

Do you sit at the table with your shoulders hunched? Do you catch yourself clenching your teeth? Do you tap your foot or your finger while you're idle? If you find yourself fidgeting or feeling tight, even when you're sitting still, chances are you're not relaxing.

Stress and anxiety can interfere with concentra-

tion, so it's important to take time to relax really relax.

One technique involves taking a mental break from the world:

Lie down or sit in a comfortable position with your eyes closed.

Check in with your body mentally. Is it tense? Sore? Imagine the discomfort melting away.

Breathe slowly, regularly and deeply.

Once relaxed, imagine you're in a favorite place or in a spot of beauty and stillness.

After five or 10 minutes, rouse yourself from the state gradually.

Step 7: Keep a positive attitude

"Happiness plays an enormous role in your outlook on life," says Dr. Takahashi. "Happiness makes you more alert and when you're alert, your senses are more open to receiving information."

And there's research to back it up. Studies show that optimists tend to live longer

Step 8: Talk to your doctor.

Many factors unrelated

to aging or genetics can contribute to memory problems. These include the use of certain medications, poor vision and hearing, vitamin deficiencies, fatigue, depression, stress and illnesses unrelated to Alzheimer's disease.

Depression in particular can cause problems with memory and concentration and often is mistaken for Alzheimer's disease in older adults. Depression can be treated, improving memory and concentration.

If you or your family worry about your memory, get evaluated. Your doctor may be able to determine whether the cause is treatable.

Step 9: Check your levels

Know your blood pressure, cholesterol and blood sugar levels. Also make sure your thyroid gland is functioning normally. These tests are relatively easy to take and are good indicators of what's going on inside your body.

Healthy blood pressure

An optimal blood pressure level is 120 or less systolic (top number) and 80 or less diastolic (bottom number). Be alert to sustained

elevations in either systolic or diastolic pressure.

Healthy cholesterol

Have your cholesterol checked by your doctor every five years more often if you have a problem with your cholesterol level.

Step 10: Keep your perspective

You're not the only one who'splaced a coffee cup on the roof of your car and then driven away. You're not the first person to dial a number only to forget whom you're calling. It happens. Take note of it, but unless you feel it's unusually frequent, don't be concerned.

"We all lose a little bit of memory over time," says Dr. Takahashi. "But years of experience often make up for the little bit of mental sharpness we've lost."

Everyone has difficulty remembering things at times. So don't lose sight of how much you do remember. Wisdom is built from a lifetime of memories.

A Woman's Intelligence


